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### **Course Description:**

This course explores the theory and application of AC and DC motors. It covers how different types of motors operate and how electronic motor control systems are designed and can be used to improve efficiency in a wide range of applications.

### **Course Outcomes:**

Upon completion of the course the student should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of the principles of magnetism, and the electrical and mechanical concepts associated with motors and generators.
- 2. Describe DC motor construction and classification by identification and description of the major components.
- 3. Describe AC motor construction and classification by identification and description of the major components.
- 4. Identify the types of starters, solenoids, relays, timers, and switches that comprise a motor control circuit.
- 5. Write a ladder diagram and a schematic diagram for the starting of both AC and DC motors.
- 6. Distinguish the differences and understand the applications of wound-field DC motor control, brushless DC motor control, stepper motor control, induction AC motor control, synchronous AC motor control, and PLC/digital motor control.
